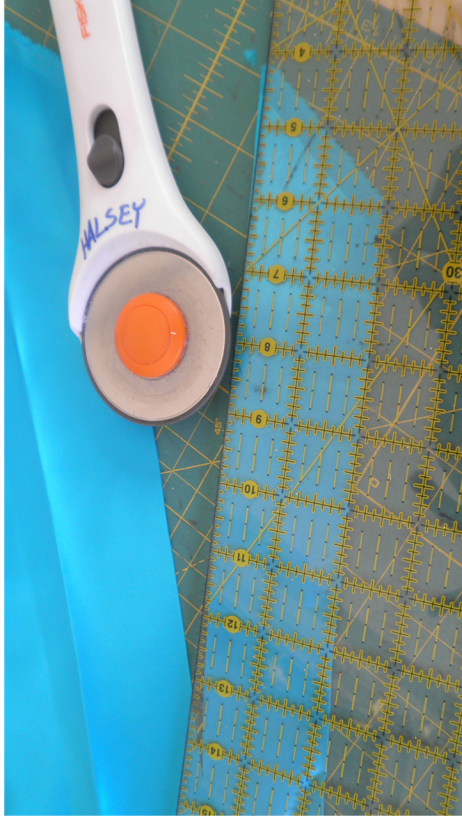


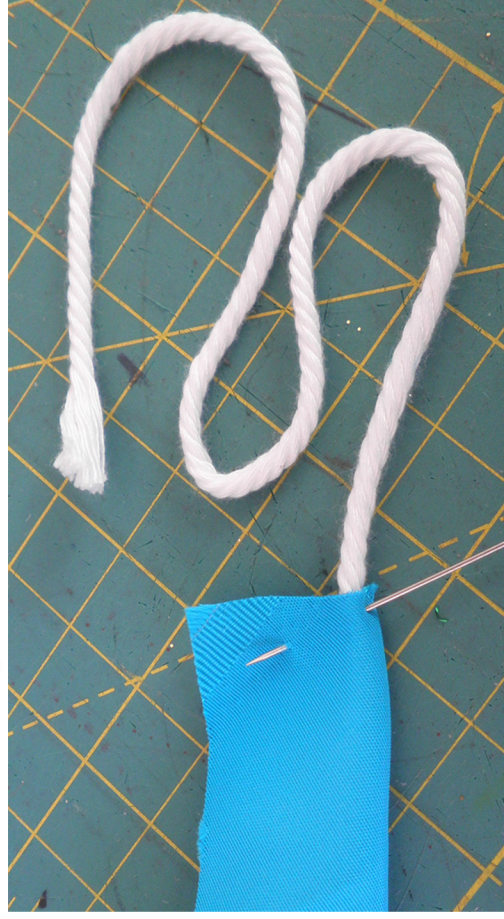
Bagged Piping

A beautiful finish to any bodice or jacket.
Instructions brought to you by Travis Halsey and Carole Klinko.



1. Cut bias. (finished width $___ \times 2 ___ + 1/2''$)

2. Measure the length of bias. However long your bias strip measures you need that same length of cording to the outside (right hand side) of your strip. It is a good idea to make the cording a couple inches longer as the bias will stretch a bit when turned right side out.



3. Right sides together pin and stitch the short edge of your bias.

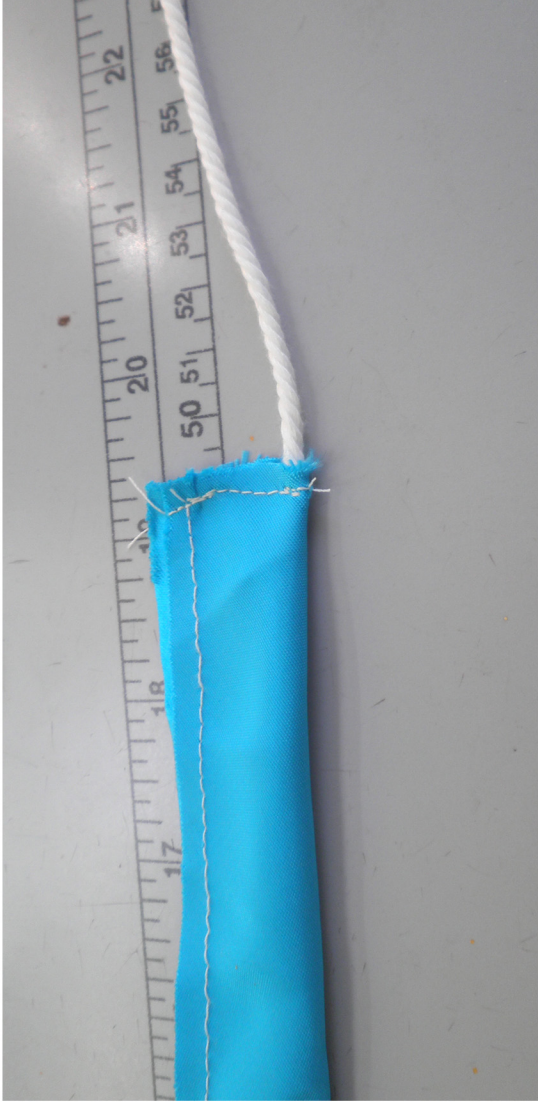

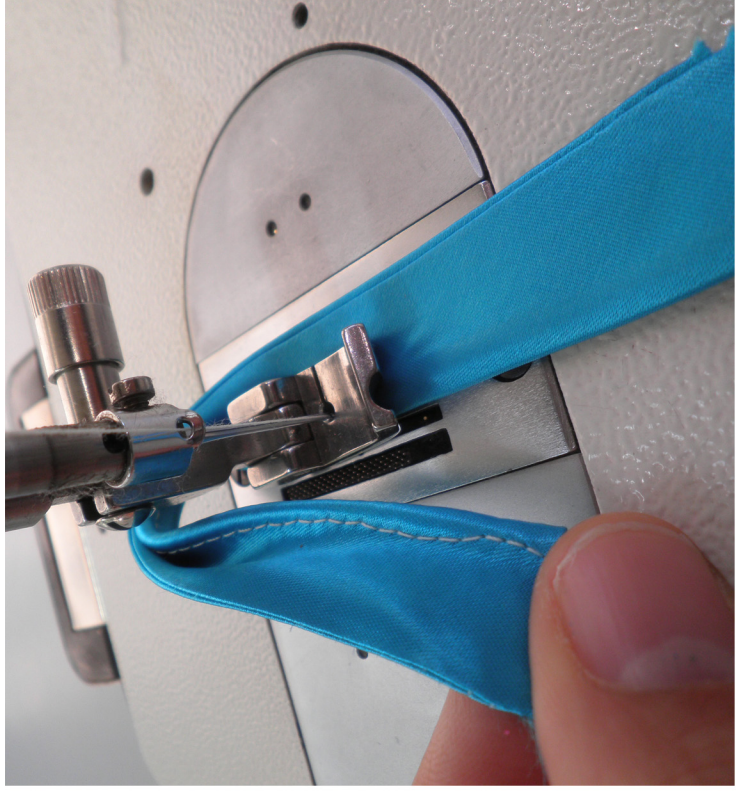
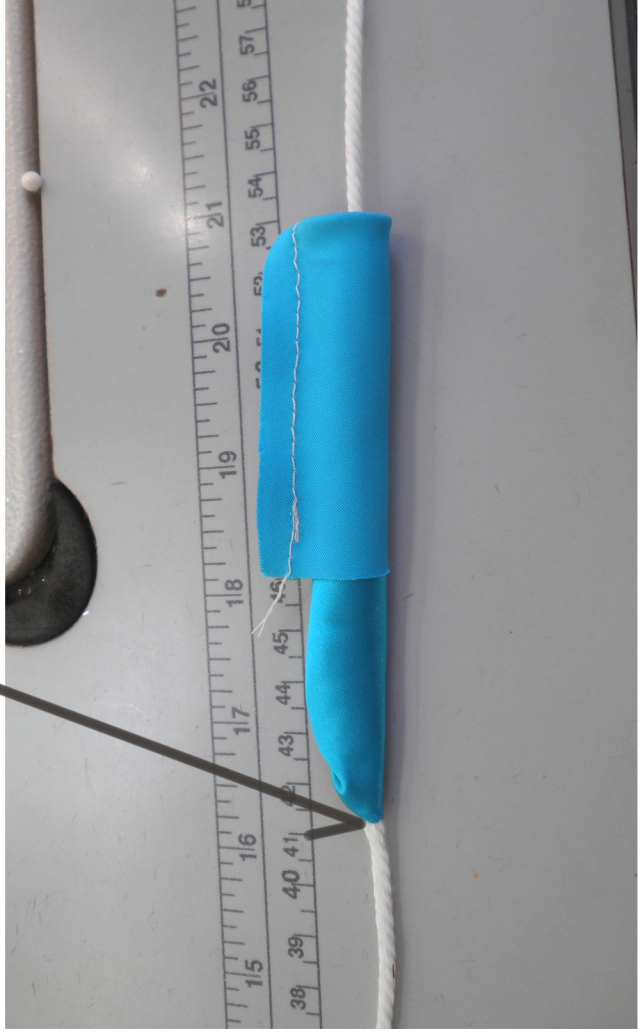

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4. Right sides together stitch a 1/4" seam allowance along long edge of bias.



5. Turn bias tube right side out over the cut end of cording. 6. Cut cording from short bagged end of bias. 7. PRESS.



8. To complete use a cording foot, or zipper foot to stitch next to piping.
